Sentence Splits

An extension of "Helping hands in Sri Lanka's big flood"

When reading stories, you may notice that some sentences are longer than others. The long sentences are often made up of parts that can stand on their own as simpler sentences. It is good to have a mix of both short and long sentences as they make the text livelier. If you have written too many long sentences, try to split them into shorter ones. This exercise gives you some practice. In the first column of the table are ten long sentences from the story "Helping hands in Sri Lanka's big flood" (page 6, *What's Up* July 2016). Read the story first. Then, separate each of the given sentences into grammatically correct simple sentences. Some parts have been done for you as examples.
