Two Truths and a Lie

An extension of "Peacemaker wins award"

On page 7 of *What's Up* January 2017 is a story about Columbia's President Juan Manuel Santos. Mr Santos showed the world that even complex wars can be stopped. He was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his efforts. Nobel prize winners, also known as Laureates, are people who have contributed an amazing amount to their fields. Learn more about some of them by conducting a quiz in your class. Next, discuss the *What's Up* article using the three guiding points given below.

A. FOR THE QUIZ

- 1. Nominate a quizmaster for the class.
- 2. Divide the class into two groups Group Einstein and Group Santos.
- 3. The quizmaster should toss a coin to decide which team plays first.
- 4. Play this game without the help of any outside resources.
- 5. The quizmaster reads three statements about a famous Nobel Laureate. Two of the statements are true and the other is a lie. The first group must identify which statement is a lie.
- 6. Five points are awarded for identifying the lie correctly and an additional 5 points are given for correcting the lie on the first try. If the group is unsuccessful, then the incorrectly answered parts of the question are passed to the next group, which will get 3 marks for identifying the lie correctly and an additional 3 marks for correcting the lie.
- 7. Repeat steps 5 and 6 for the next group.
- 8. The group with the highest tally of marks will be the winner.

B. FOR THE DISCUSSION

- 2. Have a whole-class discussion of the following:
 - a. The positive and negative character traits of Juan Manuel Santos.
 - b. The reason he was chosen for the Nobel Peace Prize.
 - c. The lessons we can learn from Mr Santos.
