Island Nations

An extension of "Japan goes back to hunting whales"

Singapore is a tiny island nation. There are other island nations worldwide, and most are much larger. Each has some features in common with Singapore and some that are different. Work in pairs on this exercise to help you to better appreciate island nations.

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Work in groups of two or three students each. Read "**Japan goes back to hunting whales**" (page 14, *What's Up* January 2019) to warm up. Two of the whaling countries mentioned in this story are island nations.
