An extension of "Remembering the killings at Tiananmen Square"

There are many ways to join sentences together. One way is to use relative pronouns. These are words that introduce a clause to tell us more about a person, place, object, or time. Some relative pronouns are **where**, **who**, **that**, and **which**.
