1. In the table below are listed some major world religions that are practised in Singapore, and what they teach us about how to treat our fellow human beings. The words may be different but there is a common theme called The Golden Rule. Unscramble the words in **bold** to discover it.

d.	Hinduism	"This is the <b>smu</b> of Dharma [duty]: Do naught unto others which would cause you <b>ipan</b> if done to you". Mahabharata, 5:1517
e.	Sikhism	"No one is my <b>neemy</b> , none a <b>rantgers</b> and <b>evoneery</b> is my friend." Guru Arjan Dev: AG 1299
f.	Judaism	"What is <b>fulthea</b> to you, do not to your <b>owlfel</b> man. This is the <b>awl</b> : all the rest is commentary." Talmud, Shabbat 31a.
g.	Christianity	"So in <b>theeryving</b> , do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the <b>Poherpts</b> ." Matthew 7:12
h.	Islam	"None of you [truly] <b>beveslie</b> until he wishes for his <b>roberth</b> what he wishes for himself." Number 13 of Imam Al-Nawawi's Forty Hadiths.
i.	Bahai Faith	"And if thine <b>yees</b> be turned towards <b>juicest</b> , choose thou for thy [your] <b>bhoureign</b> that which thou [you] choosest [choose] for thyself [yourself]." Epistle to the Son of the Wolf
j.	Jainism	"In <b>papshines</b> and <b>fufersing</b> , in joy and grief, we should regard all creatures as we regard our own <b>lefs</b> ." Lord Mahavira, 24th Tirthankara
