Zoonoses: The Infamous Five

"Vietnam bans wildlife trade" (page 9, What's Up August 2020) tells how the country has clamped down hard on the wildlife trade and why. Read the article carefully to learn about zoonoses.

Given below are the scrambled names of five zoonotic diseases. Unscramble the letters and match the words with the descriptions in the table. You may ask your parents or other adults for help and search the internet.

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1	This disease is passed on by the bite or scratch of an infected dog, cat or other animal. Initial symptoms are pain, itching, headache, fatigue, and other fairly mild symptoms. If not treated immediately with a series of injections, the disease gets worse and death is almost certain. Pet dogs and cats must be vaccinated against it to prevent infection.			
2	This disease is carried by a deer tick. A bump like a mosquito bite appears at the bite area and then disappears. However, the infection remains and manifests later — sometimes even months later. Serious complications like swollen joints, facial palsy, nerve damage, impaired memory, and even irregular heart rhythm occur. Victims who get help in time can be treated with antibiotics.			
3	A virus originating from bats causes it. This disease spreads among humans mainly through contact with respiratory droplets of an infected person. It usually causes mild to moderate flu-like symptoms. However, in severe cases the virus attacks the respiratory system and causes death. This year, nearly 20 million people were infected in nine months.

5	The disease is caused by a parasite spread through the bite of an infected Anopheles mosquito. Infected persons go through cycles of severe chills, followed by high grade fever and a return to normal temperature. They may also have nausea, muscle pain, and fatigue. There are preventive drugs and treatment but no 100% cure.
