1.	Health workers went house to house to convince people to allow their children to be vaccinated.	
2.	Vouchers were given to families whose children were vaccinated.	
3.	The cost of the Polio vaccine was heavily discounted.	
4.	Ambassadors went around to inform the people of the benefits of the vaccine and to correct false information about it.	
5.	Children who were vaccinated had their fingers marked for tracking purposes, so as to ensure that no child was missed out.	
6.	Vaccinators brought along vaccines to remote rural villages to administer the vaccine to the children there.	
7.	Posters, flyers and other awareness-raising activities helped to inform parents of the importance of vaccinating their children.	
8.	Health workers, communities, the government, UNICEF, and other partners worked together in this vaccination drive.	
9.	Social mobilisers went to public places to spread information about the vaccination campaign and to encourage people to get involved.	
10	. Celebrities were roped in to give the vaccination campaigns a publicity boost.
