## Harmony Slogans

*An activity of "Missing Roo? Queen Camilla to the rescue".*

When Queen Camilla visited the United States recently, she brought a gift to symbolise the friendship between Britain and the US. Her gift was a replica of the original Roo. Read "Missing Roo? Queen Camilla to the rescue" (page 9, *What's Up* June 2026). Carry out this activity to explore harmony amongst friends by imagining Roo's reunion with his buddies at the museum. Work in small groups of three to five members.

A. In the *What's Up* story, Roo is reunited with Winnie-the-Pooh, Piglet, Tigger, and Kanga. Imagine that Roo asks them how they stayed good friends all these years despite being so different from one another. Brainstorm what their answers to Roo may be.

e.g. "We make it a point to include everyone in our games."

e.g. "We show our gratitude by saying "thank you" to one another."

B. Select a statement from above and turn it into a slogan. Example of a popular slogan:

♦ *Say "Please", "Thank you", and "Sorry" — the three magical little words!*

Tips on writing slogans:

- Use words that are upbeat and easy to understand.
- You may use an analogy. For example, "*Play a beautiful symphony together!*".
- Think of a slogan as a shout out to harmony in friendship.
- Keep refining the slogan till you are satisfied with the final version.

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C. Create a colourful and attractive banner of your slogan. An easy way to form the base is to tape together three or four sheets of flipchart paper. Illustrate the slogan. If you wish, the slogan can be placed in a collage of paper cutouts or bits of fabric. Add your byline (your names and class) in a corner.

D. Select a spot at school — e.g. a common corridor — to put up all your class's banners. After getting permission, display the banners there for Racial Harmony Day.
